Letter to Supervisor Hahn from the Peninsula Cities: Today, May 27, the four Peninsula cities sent a letter to L.A. County Supervisor Janice Hahn requesting that the County of Los Angeles, along with the State of California, allow businesses throughout the South Bay to open within the Phase 3 guidelines while following the state and county safety protocols (see attachments). The letter noted that Peninsula businesses are ready to implement the required industry safety protocols to ensure employees and customers are protected, and that the Peninsula cities are exploring the “open street” concept, similar to other cities in the county, by issuing temporary permits to allow businesses to move their operations outside onto patios or on-site parking spaces.

Letter from the Chief Executive Office Regarding CARES Act Funding: On May 26, the City received a letter from the Los Angeles County Chief Executive Office indicating that the City may receive funds from the \$450 million in the Coronavirus Relief Fund allocated to all cities that did not receive a direct allocation from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act (see attachments). This funding could help with expenditures the City has incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Letter Supporting County Motion to Seek a Partial Variance: On May 25, the City submitted a letter of support for a motion from L.A. County Supervisors Kathryn Barger and Janice Hahn to work with the state to obtain a partial variance to move further into the state’s reopening guidelines on behalf of interested cities, and to pursue a variance on behalf of the County of Los Angeles as a whole (see attachments). The letter noted that the City could lose 9% of its revenue in Fiscal Year 2019-20 and in FY 20-21 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On May 26, the [Board of Supervisors voted](#) to move forward with seeking a variance for the county as a whole, but there was not board support to have cities apply separately.

COVID-19 Cases

As of May 26, there were 47,822 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across Los Angeles County, including the South Bay, so the public should not think one location is safer than another and everyone should be aware and practice physical distancing. The total includes 90 cases in Rancho Palos Verdes, 42 in Palos Verdes Estates, 14 in Rolling Hills Estates and two in Rolling Hills. Countywide, 2,143 people have died.

According to the Department of Public Health, 11 deaths have been reported in Rancho Palos Verdes. The City extends its deepest condolences to the families of these residents.

Census Response Rate Challenge: Have you completed your 2020 Census? Responses to the census shape decisions about how billions of dollars in federal funds flow into communities each year for the next 10 years for critical services, including health care, emergency response, schools and education programs, and roads and bridges. The COVID-19 pandemic underscores the importance of census data and census participation.

As of May 25, Rancho Palos Verdes has a 74% self-response rate, 12.7% higher than the state's average self-response rate and 13.9% higher than the national average. RPV has the second highest response rate of the Peninsula cities behind Palos Verdes Estates.

FINANCE

2020-21 Budget Public Hearing: On June 2 the City Council will conduct a public hearing on considering the adoption of the FY 2020-21 Budget. At this meeting, the preliminary budget will be presented which has been created based on City Council direction for General Fund, Capital Projects Fund, and all Special Revenue Funds. In addition to the FY 2020-21 Budget the City Council will also receive presentations on the following items:

- 2021 5-Year Model
- Small Business Financial Assistance Program Status Update
- Employee Compensation Report

April 2020 Financial Reports: The City's April 2020 Revenue and Expenditure Financial Reports will be available to view and/or download on the City's website at the end of the week. Both reports will be located at: <http://www.rpvca.gov/1066/Monthly-Financial-Reports>.

The financial data for April, along with the data for prior months, will also be available via OpenGov. OpenGov is an easy to use website that allows visitors to view monthly revenue and expenditure details using interactive charts and graphs. Small Business Financial Assistance Plan Update: On April 8, 2020, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes implemented the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan in an effort to provide relief and promote the general welfare of the City's small business community experiencing negative financial impacts stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Small Business Financial Assistance Plan is comprised of two pieces: a one-time refund of the 2020 business license tax and a community development block grant (CDBG) stimulus.

Since the implementation on April 8:

- The City has received 16 requests for business license tax refunds.
- 9 of the 16 requests were not eligible for the program
- 5 refunds totaling \$1,988 have been issued to date
- 2 requests are currently pending approval

We encourage businesses in need of assistance to visit <http://www.rpvca.gov/1284/Financial-Assistance> for information on the program and to submit a request. Businesses that apply will receive a confirmation email from staff. If an application is approved a check will be mailed directly to the business at the address on file.

The CDBG stimulus program approved by the City Council authorized the use of \$116,500 in Community Development Block Grant funds to provide loans and grants to low and moderate-income owners of businesses with five or fewer employees. These funds could be used for short-term working capital for operating expenses to retain jobs and support service delivery. In the coming weeks, City staff will provide more details of the small business loan program and how to apply.

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Ambulance Transportation Rate Change: On July 1, 2020 the Los Angeles County Emergency Medical Services Agency will put in to place maximum allowable rates for ambulance transportation that may be charged to the general public. An excerpt from their general public ambulance rate announcement is below.

- A. A ground ambulance operator shall charge no more than the following rates for one patient:
1. Response to a non-emergency call with equipment and personnel at an advanced life support (ALS) level - \$2,373.00
 2. Response to an emergency 9-1-1 call with equipment and personnel at an advanced life support (ALS) level - \$2,540.00
 3. Response to a non-emergency call with equipment and personnel at a basic life support (BLS) level - \$1,581.00
 4. Response to an emergency 9-1-1 call with equipment and personnel at a basic life support (BLS) level - \$1,695.00
 5. Mileage rate. Each mile or fraction thereof - \$19.00
 6. Waiting time. For each 30-minute period or fraction thereof after the first 30 minutes of waiting time at the request of the person hiring the ambulance - \$134.00
 7. Standby time. The base rate for the prescribed level of service and, in addition, for each 30-minute period or fraction thereof after the first 30 minutes of standby time - \$128.00

PUBLIC WORKS

Caltrans Constructs Improvements along Western Avenue: Last week, Caltrans began constructing ADA curb ramps, crosswalks and medians along Western Avenue at Peninsula Verde Drive and Trudie Drive. Due to potential lane closures, Staff has requested Caltrans to provide the City with its tentative work schedule and information regarding any lane closure. Caltrans is also scheduled to start another project in late June 2020, involving ADA curb ramp construction along Western Avenue at six intersections between West Toscanini Drive and Summerland Street. The entire project is expected to last 3-4 months. Caltrans is currently reviewing Traffic Control Plans (TCP) and will inform the City of any lane closures once the TCP is approved. The City will also provide the project schedule within the City limits, once Caltrans has finalized it. Staff will provide listserv updates regarding roadway construction and lane closures. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Los Angeles County Residential Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) Program

Discontinued: On May 19, the City received a letter from the County of Los Angeles, which informed the City that the County's PACE program was being discontinued (Attached). The PACE program allows property owners to contract for energy efficient home improvements and pay for the assessment through their property taxes. The County will continue to administer PACE assessments entered before May 13, 2020, but will not be accepting any new assessment requests. TRAILS DOS AND DON'TS

DOs

- Check the status of trails before you visit at: trails.rpvca.gov.
- Follow all Preserve rules, regulations and posted access restrictions.
- Stay at least six 6 feet from others who are not members of your household at all times.
- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.

- Pack out all trash.

DON'Ts

- Don't use trails that you know are crowded.
- Don't leave your home if you are sick with a fever or respiratory symptoms or are currently under isolation or quarantine.
- Don't gather in groups or linger at any one location except as needed for brief rests.
- Don't share food or water while out on the trails.

L.A. County Beaches are Open:

On May 13, Los Angeles County officials opened L.A. County beaches with restrictions **(these restrictions apply to RPV beaches)**.

1. Only individual or family exercises and activities will be allowed, such as walking, running, swimming or surfing.
2. Face coverings will be required out of the water and around others.
3. Six feet (or more) of physical distancing will be required between individuals outside of the same household.
4. No sunbathing, chairs, canopies, coolers, picnicking, sitting or lying on the sand.
5. No group sports (such as volleyball), gatherings or events.
6. If you or people you live with are sick, stay home!
7. Those violating beach rules may be fined or penalized.

It is our belief that your letter and efforts urging Governor Newsom to allow retail businesses statewide to reopen under the same health protocols that essential retail businesses have been allowed to operate under helped influence his announcement. And now we need you to tell the L.A. County Public Health Officials that it's time to reopen our County's economy.

As a patron of our businesses on the Peninsula, you know firsthand how difficult the stay-at-home orders have been on our business community, which is primarily comprised of independent and mom-and-pop retail outlets. It is common knowledge now that many of these businesses may not be able to sustain limited operations for much longer. We are urgently writing to you because business owners in every sector on the Peninsula and throughout the South Bay region need your immediate help. Businesses are reeling from the devastating impacts of this unprecedented health crisis. Many of our businesses have found themselves facing great uncertainty and agonizing choices, unsure if they will ever recover from the significant losses in income with each day that they are partially or fully closed. Limiting our businesses is unsustainable and will result in rising business closures and job losses, not to mention adversely impacting our city budgets.

Given the size and diversity of Los Angeles, it is not surprising that the impact of COVID-19 has differed across the County. While Los Angeles County has entered Stage 2 of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health Recovery Framework, there are areas within the County that are less affected by the pandemic, such as the South Bay as a region, and the Palos Verdes Peninsula in particular. If the Peninsula and the other South Bay cities can demonstrate an ability to protect the public and essential workers, we should be allowed to forge ahead into the less restrictive aspects of Stage 3. A similar variance concept has already

been authorized at the State level for counties that are able to attest that they are able to protect the public and essential workers. We support your motion on the May 26 Board of Supervisors Agenda to actively explore obtaining such a variance approach from the Governor so that reopening may occur city-by-city rather than subjecting the entire region to the same rules.

On May 19, the four Peninsula cities submitted for your review a reopening plan for Peninsula businesses, titled the *Peninsula Reopening Blueprint for Businesses*, which was developed in partnership with the Palos Verdes Peninsula Chamber of Commerce. The plan outlines physical distancing and safeguard protocols for various business sectors that would implement the required industry safety protocols to ensure employees and customers are protected. On May 21, your Chief of Staff Nick Ippolito provided us with appreciated suggestions on how to enhance our reopening plan. We were also pleased to hear that the Department of Public Health has reviewed our plan and will be providing us with more feedback under a separate email, which we have yet to receive. We appreciate your efforts in coordinating tomorrow's call between our City Managers and Mayors and Mr. Ippolito and some of your key staff on the economic task force you organized. It is our intent to request that the specific timeframes cited in our plan for reopening all of our business sectors is one that is achievable with appropriate safeguards and monitoring.

According to the most recent available data from the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, the Palos Verdes Peninsula has seen only 143 confirmed COVID-19 cases out of a population of about 65,000 residents. This equates to 0.22% of the Peninsula's population. The Palos Verdes Peninsula falls under the South Region of L.A. County EMS reporting area for hospital availability. Over the past two weeks, the South Region hospitals have had an average of 245 beds available for surge and also maintained an average of 45 ICU beds over the past 14 days. The South Bay can accommodate a minimum surge of 35% due to COVID-19 patients within the existing infrastructure. In addition, hospital facilities have robust plans to protect hospital workers, both clinical and non-clinical with PPE while simultaneously maintaining plans to grow surge capacity, if needed. All four Peninsula cities continue to maintain an emergency operations plan, which includes pandemic as a potential hazard.

We recognize the role social distancing has played in preventing our case count from being far higher, but we fear that limiting our businesses and waiting to allow them to safely reopen will worsen the economic health crisis created by this pandemic. As elected officials, we are contacted several times a day by our business community with reopening plans that provide safeguard measures that seem reasonable and responsible. Moreover, the Peninsula cities are exploring the "open street" concept, similar to other cities in the County, by issuing temporary permits to allow businesses to move their operations outside onto patios or on-site parking spaces.

Our businesses are ready to implement the required industry safety protocols to ensure employees and customers are protected. Please act now to allow them to fully reopen while following State and County safety protocols.

For these reasons, the Palos Verdes Peninsula cities are prepared for movement into the less restrictive portions of the Los Angeles County Public Health Recovery Framework. **We respectfully request that the County of Los Angeles, along with the State of California, allow businesses throughout the South Bay to open within the Phase 3 guidelines while following the State and County safety protocols.**

Thank you for your support and commitment to stand with your local businesses. We would appreciate an opportunity to continue discussing our reopening plan with you.

Dear Mr. Mihranian:

On behalf of Los Angeles County, thank you for your efforts to provide residents with the resources and services needed to address the impacts of COVID-19. Although the County estimates a \$1 billion decline in revenues by the end of this fiscal year, we remain dedicated to continue providing critical services to residents within our 88 cities and 141 unincorporated areas. From providing free COVID-19 testing and contact tracing resources, to public health, behavioral health, public safety, housing, homelessness prevention and other key services, the County is poised to address the ongoing needs of the region.

Like many of your cities, Los Angeles County is on the frontlines of combating this healthcare pandemic. That is why we were pleased to see that Governor Gavin Newsom's Fiscal Year 2020-21 May Budget Revision included \$1.75 billion of the State's Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funds. This newly created Coronavirus Relief Fund will allow the State to provide cities and counties with financial support to address COVID-19 related homelessness, public health and public safety services, among others.

Of note, the State will provide \$450.0 million in the Coronavirus Relief Fund to all cities that did not receive a direct allocation from the CARES Act. Of these recipients, cities with populations above 300,000 will receive a direct State allocation, while all other cities receive funding through their counties. We have been informed that the State is currently developing the methodology and funding formula for the Coronavirus Relief Fund. Once the formula and methodology have been released the County will begin working with cities to allocate these dollars.


In addition to State funding, President Donald J. Trump issued the major disaster declaration for the State of California for COVID-19 on March 22, 2020. This declaration made Federal assistance available, including the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Public Assistance (PA) funds. Cities that have provided, may provide, or are providing extraordinary emergency protective measures, which include costs associated with COVID-19 testing, may be

eligible for Federal reimbursement. The County encourages cities to contact the Governor's Office of Emergency Services, the grantee for FEMA's PA funds, at DisasterRecovery@caloes.ca.gov to apply for Federal reimbursement or to answer questions about the PA program.

It is our sincere hope that these funds will help to provide your cities with the additional resources needed to respond to this crisis. In addition, we will continue to advocate at the State and Federal level for ongoing funding to assist cities and counties to implement comprehensive COVID-19 related programs and services to meet the needs of our residents.


The City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports your motion to work with the State to obtain a partial variance on behalf of interested cities and/or regions within the County; and to immediately upon readiness under the State's variance criteria, take all steps required to pursue a variance on behalf of the County of Los Angeles as a whole. In fact, the City supports the consideration of a full variance to allow all businesses to open with perhaps stay-at-home orders applying to those 65 years old and older or with underlying health conditions.

We believe this is the right, sensible and responsible approach to reopening, rather than subjecting a vast region with such diversely impacted communities to the same guidelines. To date, Rancho Palos Verdes has seen only 86 confirmed cases of COVID-19 out of a population of about 42,000 residents. Though we have succeeded in avoiding overwhelming L.A. County's health care system, we fear that delaying safely reopening will worsen the economic health crisis created by this pandemic. We project that due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Rancho Palos Verdes could potentially lose 9% of its revenue this fiscal and next fiscal year, impacting core city services. Our business community desperately needs our help to recover from the devastating toll of this crisis.

We urge the Board of Supervisors to pass this motion and make it possible for communities that are prepared to reopen to do so as safely and soon as possible.

EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2020**

Section 7.16.280 Rate Schedule For Ambulances

A. A ground ambulance operator shall charge no more than the following rates for one patient:

Rates Effective July 1, 2020

1. Response to a non-emergency call with equipment and personnel at an advanced life support (ALS) level	\$2,373.00
2. Response to an emergency 9-1-1 call with equipment and personnel at an advanced life support (ALS) level	\$2,540.00
3. Response to a nonemergency call with equipment and personnel at a basic life support (BLS) level	\$1,581.00
4. Response to an emergency 9-1-1 call with equipment and personnel at a basic life support (BLS) level	\$1,695.00
5. Mileage rate. Each mile or fraction thereof	\$19.00
6. Waiting time. For each 30-minute period or fraction thereof after the first 30 minutes of waiting time at the request of the person hiring the ambulance	\$134.00
7. Standby time. The base rate for the prescribed level of service and, in addition, for each 30-minute period or fraction thereof after the first 30 minutes of standby time	\$128.00

B. This section does not apply to a contract between the ambulance operator and the County where different rates or payment mechanisms are specified.

Section 7.16.310 Special Charges

A. A ground ambulance operator shall charge no more than the following rates for special ancillary services:

1. Request for services after 7 PM and before 7 AM of the next day will be subject to an additional maximum charge of	\$27.00
2. Persons requiring oxygen, shall be subject to an additional maximum charge per tank or fraction thereof, and oxygen delivery equipment to include nasal cannula and/or oxygen mask, of	\$100.00
3. Neonatal transport	\$254.00
4. Registered nurse or respiratory therapist specialty care transport with equipment and personnel for up to 3 hours of transportation time	\$2857.00
5. Registered nurse and respiratory therapist specialty care transport with equipment and personnel for up to 3 hours of transportation time	\$3229.00
6. Registered Nurse and/or Respiratory Therapist per hour after the first 3 hours	\$162.00
7. Volume ventilator	\$194.00
8. Disposable medical supplies	\$29.00

- B. Where other special services are requested or needed by any patient or authorized representative thereof, a reasonable charge commensurate with the cost of furnishing such special service may be made, provided that the ambulance operator shall file with the Director of the Department of Health Services a schedule of each special service proposed and the charge therefore, which charge shall be effective unless modified, restricted, or denied by the Director of the Department of Health Services. Special services are defined as services provided to a patient that are unique and individual to a specific patient's needs, and are performed on a limited basis.
- C. Charges for special services provided to patients that are new services, but will become an industry standard, must be reviewed and a rate commensurate with the service developed prior to ambulance operators charging such rate to the general public. Such rates shall not be charged to patients until approved by the Board of Supervisors.
- D. This section does not apply to a contract between an ambulance operator and the County where different rates or payment mechanisms are specified.

Section 7.16.340 Modification of Rates.

The maximum rates chargeable to the general public as set forth in Sections 7.16.280 and 7.16.310 of this chapter shall be adjusted effective July 1, 1992, and on July 1st of each year thereafter, to reflect changes in the value of the dollar. For each of the one year periods respectively beginning July 1, 1992 and July 1, 1993 such adjustments shall be made by multiplying the base amounts by the percentage change in the transportation portion of the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, Western Region, as compiled and reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 12-month period ending with the last day of the prior month of February. Beginning July 1, 1994, and on each July 1 thereafter, such adjustments shall be determined by multiplying the base amounts by the average of the percentage changes of the transportation portion and of the medical portion of the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, Western Region, as compiled and reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 12-month period ending with the last day of the prior month of February. Beginning July 1, 2017, and on every July 1 thereafter, such adjustments shall be determined by multiplying seventy-five (75) percent of the base amounts by the percentage change of the minimum wage change in Los Angeles County as defined in County Code Section 8.100 .040 - Minimum Wage and by multiplying twenty-five (25) percent of the base amounts by the percentage change of the Medical Care line item of the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Customers, Western Region, as compiled and reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 12-month period ending with the last day of the prior month of February, except for the following changes: Registered Nurse/Respiratory Therapist per hour after the first three (3) hours adjustment shall be determined by multiplying the current charge by the percentage change of the minimum wage change in Los Angeles County as defined in County Code Section 8.100 .040 - Minimum Wage; mileage adjustment shall be determined by multiplying the current charge for the percentage change of the transportation line item of the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Customers, Western Region, as compiled and reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 12-month period ending with the last day of the prior month of February; and Oxygen, Disposable Medical Supplies, and a Ventilator adjustment shall be determined by multiplying the current charges by the percentage change of the Medical Care line item of the Consumer Price Index for all of the Customers, Western Region, as compiled and reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the 12 month period ending with the last day of the prior month of February. The result so determined shall be rounded to the nearest whole number and added or subtracted, as appropriate, to the rate. The Director of the Department of Health Services, or authorized designee, shall initiate implementation of these rate changes by notifying in writing each licensed private ambulance operator in Los Angeles County thereof, and any other individual or agency requesting such notification from the Director. Such notice shall be sent by first class mail no later than June 15 of the prior period.
