Parking Fees Coming August 2 for Crenshaw Boulevard Near Portuguese Bend Reserve

On August 2, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes will implement parking fees for Crenshaw Boulevard near the Portuguese Bend Reserve. Parking will be \$10 per block of two hours and 45 minutes for 43 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road (Zones C-F), plus a 35-cent transaction fee. Shorter or longer blocks of time are not available at this time. There are no required reservations or fees for parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road.

Visitors will pay when making their required reservation on the ParkMobile website or mobile app. Reserve your spot as early as three days in advance and until 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.

Parking reservations will remain free for all spaces south of Crest Road from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays. Parking will also remain free for Residential Recreational Parking Permit holders on Park Place (Zone A), though reservations are still required.

Visitors can make parking reservations using the ParkMobile [mobile web browser](#) or by downloading the free ParkMobile app for iOS or Android devices from the [App Store](#) or [Google Play](#). Reservations can also be made by calling ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.

DDT Dumping Update

On July 14, City Manager Ara Mihranian and Staff attended a virtual meeting hosted by Senator Dianne Feinstein's office for representatives from local, state, and federal government offices regarding the recently rediscovered DDT dumping site off the coast of Catalina Island. According to Senator Feinstein's office, efforts are now focused on gathering funding and resources to conduct another underwater mission, this time to collect sediment samples for testing to determine whether thousands of barrels dumped on the seafloor contain DDT or other chemicals. The dump site, which was first explored in March by the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UC San Diego, is just one of 14 sites where dozens of companies were permitted by the state water board to

dump chemicals and other waste from the 1930s until the practice was banned in 1972. According to the discussion, State Senator Ben Allen's office intends to call for an informational hearing to be held in the fall regarding the DDT dumping site. Representatives from Heal the Bay shared the environmental nonprofit's advocacy efforts, which include calling for the creation of a community oversight committee since questions of jurisdiction have resulted in there being no apparent lead agency on this issue. Additionally, a representative from Rep. Nanette Barragán's office expressed interest in writing a joint letter calling on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to reconvene the Fish Contamination Education Collaborative (FCEC), which works to educate vulnerable populations about the health effects of consuming contaminated fish related to the Palos Verdes Shelf Superfund Site just off the coast of Rancho Palos Verdes, which was polluted by separate DDT dumping through the sewer system. The FCEC has been on hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Staff will continue to monitor this issue.

Portuguese Bend Landslide Tour Invitation to Elected Officials

Today, Staff sent letters to L.A. County Supervisor Janice Hahn, Congressman Ted Lieu, and U.S. Senators Dianne Feinstein and Alex Padilla inviting each representative to a tour of the Portuguese Bend Landslide and seeking assistance in securing critically-needed funding to prevent an environmental and public safety catastrophe if the land continues to move at its current rate (see attachments). Staff also send letters requesting assistance seeking funding to Senator Ben Allen and Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi, who each participated in tours of the landslide in 2020. The City is seeking \$30 million for the proposed Portuguese Bend Landslide Remediation Project to slow the landslide to preserve the integrity of the Peninsula's transportation system, sanitary sewer trunk line, the recreational features of the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve, and to protect and preserve the natural habitat and marine ecology in the area. Earlier this year, Staff submitted requests for Community Project Funding and Congressionally-Directed Spending through Congressman Lieu's, Senator Feinstein's and Senator Padilla's offices, however, the project was not selected. Staff will continue to work with the City's grant management consultant to explore potential funding opportunities for this project.

Response from D.A. Gascón Regarding Special Directive Policies

On June 1, the City Council authorized the Mayor to sign a letter to Los Angeles County District Attorney (DA) George Gascón expressing concerns with the impact of his Special Directives on public safety. The Council also provided direction to Staff to bring back a

discussion on a vote of no confidence in DA Gascón if the DA's Office did not timely respond to the letter. Although Staff received confirmation that the letter was received, no substantive response was received prior to the July 20 City Council meeting. At the meeting, the City Council voted 4-1 to adopt a vote of no confidence in DA Gascón. Today, Staff received a substantive response from D.A. Gascón to the City's letter (see attachments). Staff will continue to monitor issues concerning D.A. Gascón's Special Directives.

Letter to California Citizens Redistricting Commission

Last night, the City Council directed Staff to send a letter to the California Citizens Redistricting Commission, describing the Rancho Palos Verdes community and expressing preferences for State and Congressional districting (see attachments). Due to the City's collaborative relationship with the other Peninsula cities, as well as cities in the South Bay, including sharing many economic and cultural factors, the City is requesting to continue being districted with the Peninsula cities and the northerly South Bay cities.

Residents can join the California Citizens Redistricting Commission's Community of Interest input meetings for Los Angeles County on July 30 to share how you want Congressional, and State districts are drawn. 

Cal Water Encourages Water Conservation

In response to the state's drought emergency, the California Water Service (Cal Water) is encouraging customers to practice water conservation.

Cal Water offers:

- Rebates on high-efficiency appliances and devices, with certain rebates recently doubled.
- A smart landscape tune-up program that includes an irrigation system evaluation along with installation of efficient devices and repair of most irrigation leaks at no cost to customers.
- A free conservation kit that includes a garden hose nozzle with shutoff valve, high-efficiency showerheads, faucet aerators, and more.
- Educational resources.

Cal Water is also preparing to launch a drip system conversion rebate this summer and relaunch its turf replacement program, created during the last historic drought.

Additionally, Cal Water reminds customers to continue observing the prohibited uses of water that continue to be in effect. Water-wasting activities include, in part:

- Using water on outdoor landscaping that causes runoff onto adjacent properties or paved areas.
- Using a hose to wash vehicles unless the hose has a shutoff nozzle or similar device.
- Not repairing leaks within five days of notification.

Civic Center Advisory Committee Recruitment

Do you have a vision for the future of the Rancho Palos Verdes Civic Center? The City is in the process of developing a master plan to potentially redevelop the Civic Center site on Hawthorne Boulevard, which includes City Hall, Upper Point Vicente Park and the Rancho Caninos Dog Park.



The City is accepting applications to fill two vacancies on the **Civic Center Advisory Committee**, which serves as a citizen's advisory board to the City Council advising on the development of the Civic Center Master Plan. The seven committee members play a vital role in the public outreach process, financial analysis, layout/boundary concerns, conceptual design, and other related issues. These are volunteer, non-paying positions with terms of office ending in June 2024.

The committee meets every month, typically the fourth Thursday of the month, at 6 p.m. in the Community Room at City Hall. However, due to the pandemic, the committee has been meeting virtually using the Zoom platform.

How to Apply

Those interested in applying must submit an application to the City Clerk's Office by 4:30 p.m. on **Friday, July 30**. To be considered for appointment, an applicant must be a resident of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes. To apply, please visit the [Advisory Board Recruitment](#) page on the City website. Interviews with the City Council are tentatively scheduled to take place on August 3 prior to the regularly scheduled City Council Meeting virtually using the Zoom platform. The City Clerk's Office will confirm the date and time of the interviews with the applicants.

Letter Opposing AB 500


Following last night's authorization by the City Council, today, the City sent a letter to Assemblymember Chris Ward, opposing Assembly Bill 500 (see attachments). AB 500 would expand the authority of the California Coastal Commission by granting the Commission authority to regulate oversight of development in the coastal zone and would additionally require local governments within the coastal zone to adopt streamlined permitting procedures for ADUs in the coastal zone. AB 500 curtails local land use authority by empowering the Coastal Commission to dictate housing policies to local governments, effectively limiting the City's decision-making authority over.



Indoor Mask Mandate in Effect

Following an alarming rise in COVID-19 infections, on July 16, 2021, the L.A. County Health Officer Order was modified to require masking for everyone while indoors, regardless of vaccination status to prevent increased spread.

Effective July 17 at 11:59 p.m.,
masks are required in all indoor
public places, venues, gatherings,
and businesses (including offices,
retail, restaurants, theaters, family
entertainment centers, meetings,



and state and local government offices serving the public). Some exceptions apply, similar to the exceptions in masking requirements that were in place prior to the June 15 reopening. This includes exceptions for children under the age of two, for those with certain medical conditions or disabilities that prevent masking, and for those whose job doesn't permit masking. Wildfire Preparedness Coordination Meeting with Orange County Fire Watch

On Tuesday, July 13, city staff and members of the city's Emergency Preparedness Committee met with representatives from the Orange County Fire Watch Program, a volunteer network dedicated to deterring arson, ensuring early fire detection, and educating the public about fire danger.



During this meeting, Orange County Fire Watch Program Manager Tony Pointer, shared best practices, lessons learned and insights with committee members and staff regarding the establishment, deployment, and coordination of this volunteer network, as well as the practical application of closed-circuit cameras for wildfire detection.

Tuesday's discussion centered on the process by which volunteers from the Orange County Fire Watch Network are activated and deployed to high visibility locations near likely ignition sources throughout the Orange County Parks system in response to National Weather Service Red Flag warnings indicating a high fire risk. Fire Watch Program Manager Tony Pointer, further briefed Committee Members and staff that the

Fire Watch Program employs a hybrid system of on-site and remote monitoring by enlisting several volunteers to monitor a variety of camera feeds for early indications of wildfire ignitions via the publicly accessible [ALERTWildfire camera network](#). Additionally, Tony emphasized the critical role of fire watchers in detecting and reporting fires before they spread and further noted that field fire watchers also routinely report medical emergencies due to their proximity to trailheads.

The City's Emergency Preparedness Committee is scheduled to receive a presentation on key takeaways from this meeting during their August 19, 2021, regular meeting. Court Upholds Insurance Commissioner Lara's Order to Expand FAIR Plan "Last Resort" Coverage to Better Protect Homeowners

California Department of Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara has issued the following statement after a California trial court upheld his authority to order the California FAIR Plan to offer broader coverage options to consumers who are increasingly losing their homeowners' insurance due to the risk of wildfires:

"With insurance companies increasingly dropping their customers due to wildfire risk, homeowners depend on the FAIR Plan as the insurer of last resort for their coverage. The court ruling affirms my authority that the FAIR Plan must offer broader, more comprehensive insurance protection for consumers. In addition, by forcing its

policyholders to purchase separate insurance policies for liability and contents on top of its “fire-only” policy, the FAIR Plan drives up the price for consumers, which only benefits the insurance companies that profit from this unfair and costly arrangement. California consumers win when they have greater options for insurance coverage, which is why I ordered the FAIR Plan to modernize its coverage 18 months ago. The FAIR Plan and the insurance companies who control it need to move forward to implement this needed coverage option as soon as possible, and I have directed my staff to work quickly to make sure this comprehensive coverage is available to all Californians.”

In 2019, Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara [ordered the FAIR Plan](#) to offer a comprehensive policy more akin to a traditional homeowners policy, in addition to its current fire-only coverage, so a homeowner who was non-renewed or could not obtain similar coverage from a standard insurance company could get this comprehensive coverage from the FAIR Plan. Without the Commissioner’s order, homeowners are forced to purchase an expensive and inconvenient “difference in conditions” coverage on top of their FAIR Plan “fire only” policy to get insurance coverage similar to the amount of coverage they previously had through the voluntary market.

Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Mary Strobel issued her ruling on July 12, which the Department of Insurance received on July 19, substantially upholding the Commissioner’s authority to order broader coverage options to consumers. She directed the Commissioner to remove “some liability coverages that have no relationship, nexus, or connection to the insured property” and to resubmit his order to the FAIR Plan for immediate implementation.

City Staff will continue to coordinate with the California’s Insurance Commissioner and local insurance underwriters to glean a better understanding of how the City can avoid premium hikes and reduced insurance availability for residents and neighborhoods interested in fire-hardening homes.



Human-Caused Hazards

Human-caused hazards are the result of human intent, error, or as a result of failed systems. They can be caused by accidents in human built infrastructures or technologies, or intentional human actions that cause destruction or loss of life. While most disaster type emergencies are caused by natural events outside our control, there are a number of Human Caused Disasters that could occur.

The RPV Emergency Preparedness Committee reminds you to be aware and alert by reviewing these general safety tips to help keep you and your family safe.

ACTIVE SHOOTER: An active shooter is an individual engaged in attempting to kill people in a confined space or populated area. This following describes what to do in an active shooter event. Remember, during an active shooting to RUN, HIDE, FIGHT.

Run <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Have an escape route in mind. • Leave your belongings behind. • Keep your hands visible to all law enforcement officers. 	HIDE <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hide in an area out of the active shooter's view. • Block entry to your hiding place and lock the doors. • Choose this option only as a last resort when no other options exist. • Turn off your phone to overpower the active shooter. • Act aggressively and throw items at the active shooter. 	FIGHT <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If you are trained to do so, fight back. • If you are trained to do so, fight back. • If you are trained to do so, fight back.

HAZARDOUS MATERIAL SPILL OR EVENT: Hazardous materials can include explosives, flammable and combustible substances, poisons and radioactive materials. Emergencies can happen during production, storage, transportation, use or disposal. You are at risk when chemicals are used unsafely or released in harmful amounts where you live, work or play.

Local news stations: Alert South Bay, and RPV messaging.

When disaster strikes, it often affects one or more of the utility systems in our homes. Natural disasters can strike without warning, and every emergency plan should include knowing how to shut off your utilities. Here are some tips in the event that you need to power down utilities after a natural disaster or an emergency strikes.

NATURAL GAS

Natural gas leaks and explosions cause a significant number of fires after disasters. It is important that all household members know how to shut off natural gas. Make sure everyone in your household knows the proper shut-off procedure for your meter. Do not actually turn off the gas when practicing shutting it off.

- If you smell gas or hear a blowing or hissing noise, open a window and get everyone out quickly. Turn off the gas using the outside main valve if you can, and call the gas company from a neighbor's home.
- Caution: If you turn off the gas for any reason, only a qualified professional can turn it back on. NEVER attempt to turn the gas back on yourself.
- Keep a 12-inch or larger adjustable wrench with your emergency supplies or next to your valve. Do not store the wrench on the meter or other natural gas piping or related equipment.

Step 1: Locate Your Natural Gas Meter

- It's important to know exactly where your natural gas meter is so you can find it in case of an emergency.

Step 2: Find the Natural Gas Shut-off Valve

- As you face the meter, you'll see a pipe running from the ground to the meter. There is a shut-off valve running parallel with the pipe, usually located about 6 to 8 inches above the ground.

- **To turn gas off**, Take a 12-inch or larger adjustable wrench, and turn the valve $1/4$ turn in either direction until the valve is crosswise to the pipe.
 - When the lever crosses the direction of the pipe (see below) the gas is off.


ELECTRICITY

Turning off the power to a home is crucial after a disaster because sparks from electric devices could ignite natural gas leaks.

- Unlike gas, turning off the electricity doesn't require any tools. To shut it down, locate the electrical circuit box and switch off all the individual circuits before turning off the main circuit.
- Power should remain off until a professional can ensure there are no gas leaks in the home.

Shut off electricity when:

- Arcing or burning occurs in electrical devices.
- There is a fire or significant water leak.
- You smell burning insulation.
- The area around switches or plugs is blackened and/or hot to the touch.
- A complete power loss is accompanied by the smell of burning material.




WATER

Know how to turn off the water to prevent water damage and to prevent polluted water from entering your home system. Water may be turned off at either of the two locations:

- At the main meter box (usually by the street) or
- At the main water line leading into the house. This is recommended to prevent water from flowing out of your water heater and back into the mainline. It is best to shut off water at the water heater inlet valve, often above the water heater.
- Locate the main water line leading into the house and attach a label to it for quick identification. Obtain a valve wrench for the water meter line. A valve wrench can be purchased at most hardware stores.





Refer Unhoused Persons to LA-HOP

Residents are encouraged to fill out an LA Homeless Outreach Portal (LA-HOP) request when they observe an unhoused individual at la-hop.org. A Homeless Outreach Team will be dispatched to the individual to attempt to connect them with resources. Unhoused individuals can also be reported to the Sheriff's Department at 310-539-1661, particularly if the individual is a danger to themselves or others. Deputies will make contact with the individual and will fill out an LA-HOP referral on their behalf.

Practice Safe Driving Habits

Distracted driving is dangerous. Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention from driving, including talking or texting on a phone, eating and drinking, talking to people in your vehicle, or changing the stereo or navigation system. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.

You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving has your full attention. Any non-driving activity you engage in is a potential distraction and increases your risk of crashing.


Prevent Vehicle Burglaries

Take steps today to prevent thefts from your vehicle. Residents are strongly encouraged to use "Lock It or Lose It" prevention tips every day. It only takes a matter of seconds for a thief to break into your car and grab your valuable items.

Look through the windows of your vehicle. What do you see? A bag on the passenger seat? A charging cord? A garage door opener? Change in a cup holder? Take it with you or remove it from plain view and be sure to close all windows and lock doors.

Follow these tips to help prevent vehicle burglaries:

1. Remove all valuable items from your car including purses and electronics.



2. If you must leave valuables behind, put them in your trunk before you reach your destination. Avoid doing so while in plain view.
3. Close all windows, lock your doors, and set your alarm or anti-theft device.
4. Park in a locked garage or well-lit areas.

If you see suspicious activity report it immediately to the Lomita Sheriff's Station at 310-539-1661. In case of emergency, call 9-1-1.

Things People Do During the Summer That Might Affect Their Tax Return Next Year

It's summertime, and for many people, summertime means change. Whether it's a life change or a typical summer event, it could affect incomes taxes. Here are a few summertime activities and tips on how taxpayers should consider them during the filing season.

Getting married

Newlyweds should report any name change to the Social Security Administration. They should also report an [address change](#) to the United States Postal Service, their employers, and the [IRS](#). This will help make sure they receive documents and other items they will need to file their taxes.



Sending kids to summer day camp

Unlike overnight camps, the cost of summer day camp may count towards the [child and dependent care credit](#).

Working part-time

While summertime and part-time workers may not earn enough to owe federal income tax, they should remember to file a return. In addition, they'll need to file early next year to get a refund for taxes withheld from their checks this year.

Gig economy work

Taxpayers may earn summer income by providing on-demand work, services or goods, often through a digital platform like an app or website. Examples include ride sharing, delivery services and other activities. Those who do are encouraged to visit the [Gig Economy Tax Center](#) at IRS.gov to learn more about how participating in the sharing economy can affect their taxes.

Normally, employees receive a [Form W-2, Wage, and Tax Statement](#), from their

employer to account for the summer's work. They'll use this to prepare their tax return. They should receive the W-2 by January 31 next year. Employees will get a W-2 even if they no longer work for the summertime employer.

Summertime workers can avoid higher tax bills and lost benefits if they know their [correct status](#). Employers will determine whether the people who work for them are [employees or independent contractors](#). Independent contractors aren't subject to withholding, making them responsible for paying their own income taxes plus Social Security and Medicare taxes.

Next week, crews will begin installing new curb ramps at the following locations:





Trash Generation Study

As part of the state's environmental requirements, the City's Environmental Consultant (John L. Hunter and Associates) will be conducting a daily generation rate (DGR) study. This study compares and reviews trash generation data with data from previous years to demonstrate the City's efforts in reducing trash into the storm drain system and ultimately the ocean. Littered trash will be picked up manually at five representative land use areas within the City to determine trash reduction compliance. The collections will occur over a 30-day period in the summer along representative street sweeping collection routes within the study areas. These areas include low and high density residential, commercial, public/educational, and open space areas. Collected trash in each area will be weighed, separated, and quantified by material type. The study will begin next Tuesday, July 27 and is expected to last until August 31.

LAX Community Noise Roundtable Virtual Meeting Summary

A LAX Community Noise Roundtable Virtual Meeting was held on July 14. An action item summary of the virtual meeting is as follows:

- The Roundtable approved the membership request from the Woodland Hills-Warner Center Neighborhood Council.
- The Roundtable approved submitting the North Downwind Arrival Option B proposal to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for consideration.
- Palos Verdes (PV) Peninsula passenger jet overflight and altitude data for May and June 2021 were distributed for the meeting (attached).

During the meeting, it was mentioned in passing (non-agenda item) that the federal appeals court recently ruled in favor of the City of Los Angeles against the FAA as follows:

- Two years ago, the City of Los Angeles filed a timely lawsuit against the FAA Next Generation Metroplex project for the north downwind arrival flight pattern changes without proper environmental review.
- The City of Los Angeles had standing to file the lawsuit because it protested the environmental assessment during the comment period for the project (see press release [here](#)).

In contrast, the FAA never changed the passenger jet flight routes departing from LAX, which continue to fly around and circumvent the PV Peninsula. City Staff will monitor the arrival of a new environmental assessment from the FAA, review the document and provide written comments during the new comment period. Staff will provide periodic updates about the forthcoming environmental assessment in the City Manager's Weekly Administrative Report and on the RPV Airspace Noise website [here](#). The next meeting of the Roundtable will be September 15, 2021.

ParkMobile Parking App Update

On July 6, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes launched an online parking reservation system for Del Cerro Park and the popular Portuguese Bend Reserve. Visitors can now use the ParkMobile website or mobile app to reserve parking spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and on Park Place, near the Rattlesnake and Burma Road Trailheads. A total of 290 reservations were made between July 12-18. Staff will continue to report on total reservations and other data points each week.

The system is being implemented to manage parking and improve traffic flow in the Del Cerro Park area. Staff is working closely with ParkMobile personnel to fine tune the system and respond to all user concerns and issues.

Parking with ParkMobile

- ParkMobile reservations are now required for all 60 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place.
- Reservations must be made by 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.
- Visitors will not be able to park and then reserve their spot.
- Reservations will be limited to blocks of two hours and 45 minutes from 7 a.m. to an hour after sunset (shorter or longer blocks of time will not be available when the system launches).
- Reservations will be free of charge until August 2, when parking will be \$10 per reservation block (2 hours and 45 minutes) and can be paid using ParkMobile. After that, an additional \$0.35 processing fee will apply.
- Parking will be free from 7 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays.
- Fifteen spaces on Park Place adjacent to Del Cerro Park remain available to those who hold a Residential Recreational Parking Permit at this time. Permit holders will need to reserve these spaces (in Zone A) using ParkMobile. Two additional

ADA spaces on Park Place do not require Residential Recreational Parking Permits but will require ParkMobile reservations.

- Street parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road will remain free and will not require reservations.

Visitors can make parking reservations on a mobile web browser or by downloading the free ParkMobile app for iOS or Android devices from the App Store or Google Play. Reservations can also be made by calling ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.

Meeting With PVPUSD Regarding Soccer Fields Next to Ladera Linda

On July 20, staff met with Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District (PVPUSD) Staff and Superintendent Dr. Alex Cherniss to discuss a letter sent to the PVPUSD regarding the operations and maintenance of the school district Soccer fields above Ladera Linda Community Center and Park. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss strategies to address scheduling of the fields for approved use, preventing unauthorized use of the fields, operations of the Forrestal vehicle gate, participant parking and related traffic, unauthorized/afterhours use, maintenance of the fields, and repairs due to vandalism.

In response to the significant increase in visitation to the City with record numbers of people using parks and open space areas on the Peninsula, City Staff and PVPUSD are committed to working together to maintain control of who is accessing the soccer fields. Over the past few months, in an effort to help PVPUSD eliminate afterhours and unauthorized use of the PVPUSD soccer fields, RPV Staff patrolled the PVPUSD fields and staged a Park Ranger vehicle on Forrestal near the lower field stair entrance. Although this was successful in reducing unauthorized use, RPV does not have the staffing resources to continue this practice. At this meeting, several potential solutions and action items to maintain control of the fields and reduce impacts on the PVPUSD fields, Ladera Linda community and the Ladera Linda Community Center and Park were discussed.

Solutions and action items included:

- Removing the stairs leading to the lower soccer fields from Forrestal, and the stairs leading to the lower fields from the Ladera Linda Community Center and Park upper parking lot. The City is coordinating all work with PVPUSD and is in the process of getting quotes to begin removing the stairs as early as next week.
- Prohibit parking on Forrestal Drive beyond the gate, except for authorized equestrian parking coordinated through the City. Parking related to PVPUSD soccer field use will take place in the parking lot located on PVUSD property. Any need for overflow parking should be limited to the PVPUSD side of Main Sail Drive.
- Asking PVPUSD and any parties authorized to use the fields to provide staffing for Forrestal gate operations to control traffic and access of the fields when fields are in use.

Lastly, the City is in the process of finalizing a plan to install fencing in the Ladera Linda Community Center and Park upper parking lot and along Forrestal Drive to prevent the public from accessing the fields from the Ladera Linda Community Center and Park upper parking lot and along Forrestal Drive.



Summer Movies in the Park

The second Movie in the Park, "Trolls World Tour," was held July 17 at RPV City Hall/Civic Center. Approximately 500 people brought their blankets and beach chairs for an evening out. Pre-movie activities were provided by ElectriKIDS. Mayor Alegria along with Recreation and Parks Staff hosted a fun trivia contest before the movie started. A crepe food truck was on site for attendees to purchase dinner and treats.





These numbers reflect when staff is able to make contact with the public while on patrols. Public contact is dependent on tides which contribute to an increase or decrease of activity in the Marine Protected Area.

In response to an increase of poaching within the City of RPV, the Open Space Management Division (OSM) initiated tide pool patrols to patrol our two MPAs, the Abalone Cove limited take SMCA and the Point Vicente no-take SMCA. June 27, 2020 was the first date of these new patrols. This report captures the data collected from the whole year.

Poaching activity is down overall; however, there is a noticeable uptake as visitation increases to our MPAs, especially Abalone Cove. Because of this, the primary issues that we are now encountering are people removing wildlife and handling wildlife, rather

than consumptive take. Additionally, another issue that we are now encountering are boats fishing from within the Point Vicente SMCA. Overall, despite there still being high instances of MPA violations, those that are contacted by our staff are compliant and seem genuinely unaware that they are engaged in illegal activity. For the future, OSM will continue to patrol our MPAs and work to install signage in an effort to combat poaching activity.

On July 15, a panga boat landed at Sacred Cove.

Rangers assisted Los Angeles County Sheriff Department, Homeland Security, Los Angeles County Fire Department, and United States Coast Guard in searching for individuals, and investigating the panga boat for additional evidence.



New trash cans were installed at Abalone Cove Park as a result of reoccurring issues with litter to deter wildlife from accessing trash.

On July 15 and July 17, two separate patrons were stung by stingrays while swimming at Abalone Cove Beach. Lifeguards provided first aid and medical care.



On July 18, patrons reported a rattlesnake on Beach School property. The rattlesnake was relocated safely, and staff educated the public about rattlesnake identification, behavior, and safety.



Ocean Trails Reserve

As a result of a landslide within Ocean Trails Reserve, trail closures remain in effect including the Coastal Switchback Trail and adjacent beach area. The nearby bridge along Catalina Trail and Lakeview Trail is also closed as a result of land movement. Geologists will inspect this area weekly to monitor additional movement and provide recommendations to staff for trail reroutes when deemed safe.

Portuguese Bend Reserve

Temporary barriers have been secured in place to deter unauthorized vehicle entry into Burma Road Trail. Preserve hours are still enforced. The City is assessing repairs with the contractor to determine the scope of work and will continue to provide updates regarding the status and repair of the gate.



On July 17, a fire hydrant was damaged at Burrell Lane and Crenshaw Blvd. The resulting water drained out onto Burma Road Trail, the canyon below, Kelvin Canyon, and Gary's Gulch Trail. The grade dip installed on Burma Road Trail earlier this year served as an important deterrent to direct water off of the trail to prevent further damage. The water was shut off approximately three hours later. Rangers were on site to monitor impacts, reroute patrons to alternative access points, and provide information regarding the incident.

Parks and Trails Open

County and State of California Health Officer Orders, private, informal, outdoor gatherings outdoors are permitted. L.A. County continues to urge everyone, especially those who are not or cannot be vaccinated against COVID-19 to exercise caution and good judgment as physical distancing requirements and capacity limitations have lifted. In addition, all individuals must follow the requirements in the Guidance for the Use of Face Coverings issued by the L.A. County Department of Public Health.

When participating in gatherings or activities, all park rules must be followed and attendance at informal gatherings cannot exceed thresholds in the Special Event Permits ordinance.

On behalf of the City Council of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, I am writing to invite you to a tour of the Portuguese Bend Landslide — one of the largest continuously active landslides in the United States. The Portuguese Bend Landslide affects a major transportation route and sanitary sewer trunk line serving tens of thousands of residents of the Palos Verdes Peninsula, and is in jeopardy of failing due to the active land movement. The City seeks your immediate assistance in securing critically-needed funding, including potential infrastructure bill funding, to prevent an environmental and public safety catastrophe if the land continues to move at its current rate.

Triggered in 1956, prior to the City's incorporation in 1973, the Portuguese Bend Landslide has caused significant infrastructure damage to homes, utilities, and roadways, costing the taxpayers of Rancho Palos Verdes hundreds of thousands of dollars annually in roadway repairs. With the proposed Portuguese Bend Landslide Remediation Project, the City is seeking to slow the landslide to preserve the integrity of the Peninsula's transportation system, sanitary sewer trunk line, the recreational features of the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve, and to protect and preserve the natural habitat and marine ecology in the area.

Major landslide movement, which has occurred in other nearby landslides, such as the Paseo Del Mar landslide in San Pedro in 2011 and the Ocean Trails landslide in 1999, has the potential to permanently close Palos Verdes Drive South. This would eliminate the only roadway connection between the eastern side of the Palos Verdes Peninsula and the City of Los Angeles. Equally critical is the potential interruption of the sanitary sewer transmission main line that serves tens of thousands of Peninsula residents, which could force the relocation of those residents from their homes, and could adversely impact the local economy with the closure of businesses while repairs are being made. Damage to the sewer main also poses a serious threat to the sensitive Pacific Ocean shoreline ecosystem, including the Abalone Cove Ecological Reserve, from uncontrolled discharge of untreated sewage. The recent closure of Dockweiler and El Segundo beaches due to

a spill of 17 million gallons of sewage underscores the looming threat facing Rancho Palos Verdes if the roadway continues to move and the existing sewer trunk line is severed. Additionally, if Palos Verdes Drive South were to fail, road users would face a detour of over 15 miles, precious time in the event of evacuations due to a wildfire (virtually the entire Peninsula falls within a Cal Fire-designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone).


While the City expends precious funds to diligently resurface and adjust the roadway, and the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County routinely adjusts the above-ground sewer main (the status quo situation), it is time for a solution and the dedication of funding to ensure the long-term protection of the public infrastructure and the surrounding environment.

Since the late 1950s, land movement had been thought to be unsolvable based on existing technology. However, new developments have created a clear path for how to reduce land movement. The City has developed a concept design and is currently completing the California Environmental Quality Act compliance process before proceeding to final design and construction. We estimate \$30 million will be needed to complete construction of this critical project, an investment that would prevent a far higher cost in the event of disaster.

Time is critical and we are turning now to our federal, state and county representatives to assist in giving this regional concern the long overdue attention and resources it warrants. We request a site tour be scheduled at your earliest convenience so that you can observe the severity of the problem and the damage that has occurred to the environments and surrounding homes to date. We need your assistance in completing and funding this significant capital project sooner, rather than later — or when it's too late.

Re: Concerns Regarding Special Directive Policies Impacting Public Safety

Dear Mayor Alegria,

Thank you for contacting me on behalf of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes to share concerns related to my office's policies. I lead a community-first administration and we are committed to doing everything we can to clarify misconceptions that have arisen surrounding my Special Directives. To address your concerns, I have included some brief responses below.

As your elected District Attorney, I am committed to enhancing public safety. I am looking forward to partnering with the City of Rancho Palos Verdes to ensure that the concerns of your constituents are answered, and that my office remains as transparent and accessible as possible.

Cash Bail (Special Directive 20-06):

As you may remember, the "zero bail" policy was implemented for certain non-violent, non-serious misdemeanors and felony arrests in response to COVID-19 health concerns under the prior administration. That policy remains in place. When I assumed office, I issued an additional pretrial release directive, the origins of which stem from a recent court case (*People v. Humphrey*). The court case was first decided in 2018 and greatly influenced my directive. A few months into my administration, *Humphrey* was affirmed by highest court in our state: the California Supreme Court. Consequently, LADA's cash bail policy now mirrors the "law of the land" for California as a whole, as determined by the Court.

In both the *Humphrey* decision and my pre-trial policy, however, there are exceptions. A person can be remanded based on (1) their threat of danger to the community and (2) the risk of flight.

Misdemeanor Cases (Special Directive 20-07):

Misdemeanors account for approximately 70% of all cases filed every year by our office. They consume vast resources that could be used on the prevention and prosecution of **violent** offenses. Prosecuting non-violent, non-serious misdemeanors are not a proper expenditure of our resources. In addition, prosecuting first-time non-violent misdemeanors actually **increases** the

likelihood of re-offense. However, a recent [study](#) shows people who were arrested but not prosecuted for low level non-violent misdemeanors (such as those in Special Directive 20-07: trespassing, disturbing the peace, drug and paraphernalia possession, under the influence of controlled substance, public intoxication, and resisting arrest), were 58% **less** likely to commit another crime in the following two years, than those who **were** prosecuted for that same minor crime. Non-prosecution also reduced the rate at which nonviolent misdemeanor defendants were charged with subsequent **violent** offenses within two years by 64%, relative to comparably prosecuted defendants.

Agencies equipped with the social-service tools necessary to address the underlying causes of offenses such as unlicensed driving, sex work, drug possession, drinking in public, and trespassing, are best positioned to prevent recidivism and will thus be empowered to provide help to those in need. There is no public safety benefit to prosecution over services, for first offenders of these non-violent crimes. Rather, pursuing such cases actually deters our ability to focus on the crimes that harm our communities the most.

That being said, the Directive also instructs offenders who do pose an identifiable safety risk or engage in specific repeat offenses to be prosecuted accordingly (page 2 of Special Directive 20-07).

If such cases are not being pursued accordingly in Rancho Palos Verdes, please advise your local law enforcement to track the names and dates of the arrest for the declined offenses in order to document a repetitive behavior that needs our attention.

Sentencing Enhancements (Special Directive 20-08; 20-08.2):

Sentencing enhancements are driving mass incarceration in California. Enhancements have **never** been shown to enhance safety, but excessive sentences [have](#) been shown to drive re-offense and future victimization. The purpose of my office is to not only seek justice for existing victims of crime, but to prevent future victims.

Enhancements are also *the* primary driver of a carceral system that needlessly syphons billions into jails and prisons, and away from our communities and the investments victims of crime [want](#) us to make. Enhancements are also [three times more likely](#) to be applied to defendants who are African American or mentally ill. We cannot continue to pursue approaches that criminalize and harm our communities, while providing no public safety benefit to them.

This office does, however, continue to seek sentencing as provided by law. Most felony offenses have a sentencing triad. For example, an individual convicted of violating Penal Code section 211 (Robbery) can be sentenced to either 2, 3, or up to 5 years, or 4, 5, or up to 6 years in state prison. Depending on the facts of the case, the office has the discretion to pursue any of the above. Enhancements have served as simply **extra** time added on these base sentences. They can add years or often decades on top of already lengthy prison sentences, which [research](#) has shown

does not provide a public safety benefit. The underlying charges have their own punishment scheme.

Punishment must be in the community's best interest, proportional, and it must serve a rehabilitative or restorative purpose. Sentencing enhancements do not provide any public safety benefit, and therefore are no longer pursued by this office, excluding those that victimize our most vulnerable (Special Directive 20-08.2). However, even in those instances I am committed to working with state legislators to pursue crime-specific bills to more effectively target the root causes of these violations--an approach that **has** been shown to be effective, where enhancements have actually failed.

In the United States, Prosecutors have nearly absolute discretion regarding whether or not to bring criminal charges and what charges to bring. This is not unique to Los Angeles or California. It is in line with standard legal procedure and within my office's purview to decide which charges to bring and when. Prosecutorial decisions are not subject to judicial review or reversal except in extremely narrow circumstances.

I do not take this responsibility lightly. One of the many reasons I sought this office was to improve the health and safety of our communities--for my family, and yours. Public safety is paramount to the work of the District Attorney's office, and to my life's work. As a former police chief, assistant police chief, and District Attorney in three major cities, I've been able to reduce violent crime in **every** position I have held. Reducing violent crime throughout Los Angeles County continues to be my priority goal. My office is taking proactive steps and using innovative approaches towards this effort, in tandem with the work to unwind ineffective, outdated, expensive, and racist approaches that have been proven to only counteract this goal.

I hope this response addresses your concerns. I remain deeply committed to public safety, and to our communities. I look forward to working with you in the future.

Dear Commissioners:

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is located on the Palos Verdes Peninsula in Los Angeles County. The City shares the Peninsula with the cities of Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates. The Peninsula is currently represented by the 33rd U.S. Congressional District, the 26th State Senate District, and the 66th State Assembly District.

The Peninsula cities share one school district, one library district, one local transit authority, one land conservancy, and frequently work together on areas of mutual interest such as emergency preparedness and public safety. The cities of Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates additionally share a regional contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department for law enforcement, and the four cities contract with the Los Angeles County Fire Department.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes has been intimately tied to the coastal cities and communities of the South Bay region, including, but not limited to, the Peninsula cities, Torrance, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, and El Segundo, many of which are within the jurisdiction of the California Coastal Commission. We share with our northerly South Bay neighbors a dependence upon a common transportation network for access to the rest of the Los Angeles region, and share many economic and cultural factors.

We are primarily a residential community and share a common affinity and appreciation of the unique physical and cultural environment afforded by our location along the coast. Many of the prominent regional community organizations serve the area extending northward from Rancho Palos Verdes toward Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). The City of Rancho Palos Verdes considers itself to be an integral part of the South Bay, as evidenced by its active participation in the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG).



Attachment 1: Map of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes



SUBJECT: Notice of Opposition to AB 500

Dear Assemblymember Ward:

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes opposes Assembly Bill No. 500, which would broaden the California Coastal Commission's authority to include housing policy within the coastal zone.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes recognizes that housing stock, affordability and homelessness are among the most critical issues facing California cities. Affordably priced homes are out of reach for millions of people, and housing is not being built fast enough to meet the current or projected needs of people living in the state. The City of Rancho Palos Verdes lays the groundwork for housing by planning and zoning new projects in our community based on public input, state housing laws, existing infrastructure, protected biological resources, California Environmental Quality Act, and certification by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD).

Planning for and ultimately adopting a City housing element is a laborious, time consuming, and costly process. By the end of 2022, more than two million units of additional housing, at all income levels, will be identified and zoned accordingly to immediately allow much needed housing over the next eight years as part of the 6th Regional Housing Needs Allocation cycle. Importantly, these two million units will be protected by the Housing Accountability Act, which prohibits a city from denying a housing project that is consistent with local zoning.

AB 500 disregards the housing element process and instead adds an additional regulatory agency to an already complex process involving HCD and local governments.

The law is clear on the purview of the Coastal Commission and its responsibilities — housing is not one of them. That authority lies within local governments that are

responsible for the content and progress of their housing elements and Local Coastal Plans (LCPs), which guide coastal development. LCPs are local government policies. The City of Rancho Palos Verdes opposes legislation that grants authority to the Coastal Commission that is inconsistent, duplicative, and overlapping with the authority of other regulatory agencies.

Additionally, AB 500 removes language which specifically exempts “housing policies and programs” from being required content within a LCP. The removal of this provision is problematic as it is perceived to grant additional authority to the Commission over the content of LCPs, which it does not currently allow.

California desperately needs more housing at all income levels. Unfortunately, AB 500 will not help spur much needed construction. Rather, this measure will further complicate the planning and zoning process, which will lead to additional uncertainty and delay.

For these reasons, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes opposes AB 500.




The graphs below show the total number of jets turning south upon departure from LAX and the number of those departures that fly over the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

Sample Jet Departure Flight Track Over PV Peninsula





FEUER ANNOUNCES VICTORY IN ONE OF CITY'S LAWSUITS AGAINST THE FAA



Los Angeles—City Attorney Mike Feuer announced today that the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals (Court) ruled in favor of the City of Los Angeles deciding that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) violated three key environmental laws when it changed flight patterns in 2018 for aircraft coming into LAX over mid-City and Central Los Angeles. As a result of the Court's decision, the FAA must now undertake the proper environmental analysis that should have taken place prior to implementing these changes. Two years ago, Feuer sued the FAA alleging that the agency made changes to flight patterns with neither environmental review nor public input.

“The FAA made changes to a major flight path over Los Angeles without considering the noise and environmental impacts for residents below, and without

include public comment."

The Court held that the FAA violated three key federal environmental laws by implementing the flight pattern changes at LAX as part of its rollout of its Next Generation Air Transportation System (NextGen):

- 1) National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA);
- 2) National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA); and
- 3) Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act (Section 4(f))

To remedy these violations, the Court ordered the FAA to undertake proper NEPA and NHPA analysis and to consult with the City of Los Angeles regarding Section 4(f). While the problematic flight patterns will remain in place for now, the Court's ruling requires that FAA undertake a more transparent and public process moving forward.

Five years ago, as part of the FAA's implementation of the SoCal Metroplex Project and NextGen procedures, the agency started changing flight patterns for aircraft landing at LAX, including consolidating flight patterns over West Adams and other communities in mid-City and Central Los Angeles, causing significant noise and environmental impacts. In May, 2018, the FAA made additional changes to incoming flights but allegedly failed to perform the required environmental review or seek public comment. These changes prompted Feuer's lawsuit.

The City of Los Angeles previously requested the FAA address a series of specific modifications to at least partially provide some relief to residents, but that proved unsuccessful, and the City filed its lawsuit in June, 2019.

Among other things, the City claimed in its suit that the FAA failed to comply with its own procedures and properly consider all of the environmental impacts of the changes to its flight patterns for incoming aircraft at LAX. During the course of litigation, FAA presented documents to the Court that allegedly confirmed that environmental review had occurred, but the Court held that these documents were deficient because they postdated the publication of the flight pattern changes by several months.

This lawsuit is one of three that Feuer has brought against the FAA on behalf of the City of Los Angeles in regards to NextGen. The second is

Tehachapi Valley, possibly the Santa Monica Mountains and others not near

the airport who are now experiencing air traffic for the first time or to a degree never before experienced. The FAA denied the City's request to remedy the southerly shift on the basis that FAA had not caused the shift.

The third case has to do with the City's Freedom of Information Act request in regards to flight procedures at Hollywood-Burbank Airport. Feuer's Office has since received the requested documents, and the parties are negotiating resolution.

City Attorney Feuer has been communicating directly with the FAA's Regional Administrator, the FAA's counsel and members of Congress seeking to obtain relief for impacted residents. Additionally, with federal and local officials, he has pushed the FAA to conduct a thorough environmental assessment of prospective flight pattern changes over the South San Fernando Valley and Santa Monica Mountains. The FAA agreed to conduct that assessment and to consider dispersal of flights in the process.

Accordingly, you may wish to omit personal information from your oral presentation or written materials as they may become part of the public record regarding an agendized item.
