

### Cal Water Roadwork on PV Drive East and Via Subida Starting November 15

As early as November 15, a Cal Water contractor will begin installing water pipeline along Palos Verdes Drive East from Via Colinita to La Vista Verde Drive, and in the 6200 block of Via Subida.

**UPDATED HOURS:** Work will take place over two months from approximately 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Mondays and from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Tuesday-Friday. No work will take place from November 22-26, and December 20-31. Cal Water will minimize traffic impacts and notify customers of any service interruptions.

Please proceed cautiously through the work zone and obey all signs and



The goals of the LA vs Hate campaign are to address the normalization of hate and inspire people to stand up to it; to build understanding about what constitutes a hate act and how to report it; and to support individuals and communities as they heal from the trauma of hate.

By tracking and reporting hate we can ensure that resources are allocated appropriately, that those targeted by hate receive the support they need, that offenders are held accountable, and that together, we can build respectful and resilient communities.

## Congress Passes \$1.2 Trillion Infrastructure Bill

On November 5, Congress passed President Biden's \$1.2 trillion Infrastructure Investments and Jobs Act bill package, which includes \$550 billion in new spending for transportation, broadband, utilities, and other infrastructure upgrades. The bill now awaits President Biden's signature.

According to Governor Newsom's office, the State of California expects to receive:

- \$25.3 billion for federal-aid highway apportioned programs and \$4.2 billion for bridge replacement and repairs over five years
- \$9.45 billion over five years to improve public transportation options across the state
- \$384 million over five years to support the expansion of an EV charging network in the state and the opportunity to apply for the \$2.5 billion in grant funding dedicated to EV charging
- A minimum of \$100 million to help provide broadband coverage across the state
- \$84 million over five years to protect against wildfires and \$40 million to protect against cyberattacks
- \$3.5 billion over five years to improve water infrastructure across the state and ensure clean, safe drinking water for California communities
- \$1.5 billion for infrastructure development for airports over five years

Staff will work with the City's grant management consultant, Blais & Associates, to monitor funding opportunities from the spending package, including potential opportunities to help cover costs of the proposed Portuguese Bend Landslide Remediation Project.

## **DDT Dumping Update**

Today, City Manager Ara Mihranian and Staff attended a virtual meeting hosted by Senator Dianne Feinstein's office for representatives from local, state, and federal government offices regarding the recently rediscovered DDT dumping site off the coast of Catalina Island. As Senator Feinstein's office continues working to secure funding, a group of federal and state government agencies are coordinating to conduct a follow-up survey as early as next spring or summer at the 3,000-foot-deep dump site, which is just one of 14 sites where dozens of companies were permitted by the state water board to dump chemicals and other waste from the 1930s until the practice was banned in 1972. At this time, the agencies do not believe there is alarm concerning immediate impacts on human health. Representatives from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are also reviewing historical records to shed light on the content and source of thousands of barrels discovered on the seafloor during the first mapping mission in March. Notably, NOAA and the EPA now believe the Montrose Chemical Corporation did not dump DDT into the ocean in barrels as was previously understood, but rather by releasing liquid bulk directly into the ocean from barge holding tanks. It is Staff's understanding that there may have been confusion in reviewing past records due to the use of the term "barrel" to describe a unit of measurement. The agencies believe this activity accounted for about one-quarter of Montrose's ocean dumping, with three-quarters taking place through the sewer system onto the Palos Verdes Shelf just off the coast of Rancho Palos Verdes. NOAA and the EPA are working on building a website with comprehensive information for the public to understand this complex issue. Staff will continue to monitor this issue.

## **Metropolitan Water District of Southern California Declares Drought Emergency**

With record dry conditions straining Southern California's water supplies, on November 9, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California's Board of Directors declared a Drought Emergency and called for increased efforts to maximize conservation, especially in communities facing the greatest challenges.

The declaration comes as California grapples with unprecedented conditions on state water resources. Water years 2020 and 2021 were the driest two-year sequence on record for precipitation in the state. And in August, Lake Oroville – the main reservoir on the State Water Project – reached its lowest point ever since being filled in the 1970s.

As part of the emergency declaration, Metropolitan's board called on its member agencies dependent on state project water to use increased conservation measures or other means to reduce their use of these limited supplies.

To help the region save water, the board also approved a series of measures to expand various rebate and water-efficiency programs.

## Pfizer Vaccine Now Available to Children Ages 5-11

Los Angeles County vaccine providers are now administering the Pfizer vaccine to children 5 to 11 years old after U.S. Centers for Disease Control, and Prevention Director Rochelle P. Walensky affirmed the recommendation by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to expand the emergency use authorization for the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine.

In L.A. County, an estimated 900,000 children between the ages of 5 and 11



are newly eligible for vaccinations.

All L.A. County Department of Public Health sites began offering Pfizer for children 5 to 11 years old on November 3, 2021, along with many pharmacies and clinics. Some sites require appointments; walk-ins are welcome at the Public Health sites. Children will need to be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult and have a signed consent form.

Parents are able to make an appointment using the County website at [VaccinateLACounty.com](https://VaccinateLACounty.com) and will be able to make an appointment using [MyTurn.CA.gov](https://MyTurn.CA.gov). Many pharmacies and clinics countywide are also accepting appointments through their own systems. Parents are encouraged to call the site ahead of time to verify that they are vaccinating children.



## Upcoming Community Emergency Response Training (CERT) Training Classes

The Los Angeles County Fire Department will be offering free Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training in January 2022 for the Palos Verdes Peninsula Community to develop a community response to emergencies. (see attachments). Following a major disaster, police, fire, and medical personnel may not be able to fully meet the demand. People will have to rely on each other to meet immediate life-saving and life-sustaining needs. Developed through FEMA, the L.A. County Fire Department's Community Emergency Response Training (CERT) program provides basic training in safety and life-saving skills for the public. The sessions will be provided on Saturdays, January 25, 22, and 29, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at Rancho Del Mar Continuation School (38 Crest Rd West, Rolling Hills, CA 90274).

The training course will be a series of three classes on January 15, 22, & 29 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 pm. It emphasizes that masks must be worn. The location is Rancho Del Mar Continuation School, 38 Crest Rd West, Rolling Hills, CA 90274. The training is free and sign-up is via email to gk1319@yahoo.com or 310 780-6867. Please include your name, phone number, and email address. Class size is limited. Sign up today to reserve your seat. CERT Class information is also posted on the Fire Department website: <http://fire.lacounty.gov>. Students must complete all 20 hours of the course to receive a certificate of completion. If you must miss any units, you can make them up anywhere CERT is taught to receive your certificate.

These CERT classes are FREE and are crucial for improving the safety of communities through emergency preparedness. 

## Peninsula Public Safety Committee and Regional Contract Law Committee Meetings November 18, 2021

The Peninsula Public Safety Committee (PPSC) and the Regional Contract Law Committee (RCLC) will convene for their quarterly meeting on Thursday, November 18, in an online meeting format. The PPSC will convene at 7:30 a.m., and the RCLC will commence after its conclusion.



The PPSC consists of two councilmembers from all four Peninsula Cities. The PPSC meets quarterly to discuss collaborative efforts on ensuring Peninsula-wide emergency preparedness and public safety. The PPSC combines emergency preparedness initiatives and public safety trends and topics, pertaining to the Peninsula.

The RCLC is comprised of two councilmembers from Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates, who meet quarterly to oversee the cities' contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

## Disasters Don't Plan Ahead - You Can

Disaster can happen at any time, often with little to no warning. The widespread devastation caused by a catastrophic disaster has the potential to cut you off from the rest of the world for several days.

Following a disaster, emergency rescuers will arrive on the scene as soon as possible to assist you, but it may take some time for them to reach you. The time to start thinking about what to do



in an emergency is before it happens. By following some simple guidelines, you can help prepare your family, neighborhood, business or school to be better prepared and self-sufficient after the next disaster.

⇒ **HAVE A PLAN:** A good place to begin emergency preparedness is by writing a Family Emergency Plan. Your Plan should include every member of your household, including pets. Your family may not be together if a disaster strikes, so it is important to talk to your friends and family about how you will communicate before, during, and after a disaster.

⇒ **KEEP SUPPLIES:** A Disaster Supply Kit is any pre-assembled group of items that will improve the health and safety of your family during a disaster. Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Download an emergency supply list at [ready.gov/kit](https://www.ready.gov/kit) to get started on your kit. [#BeReady #BuildAKit](#)

⇒ **BE INFORMED:** It is important to Know what disasters and hazards could affect your area, how to get emergency alerts, and where you would go if you and your family need to evacuate. Make sure your family has a plan and practices it often.

### Emergency Alerts

Disaster can happen anytime, in any part of the country. When emergencies occur, public safety officials provide critical alerts and warnings to local communities. Through a variety of technologies, these organizations communicate critical information and occasionally order evacuations, allowing residents to take immediate action to stay safe.

There are many emergency mass notification communication tools available to residents and businesses in Los Angeles County. For example, the Emergency Alert System broadcasts emergency information directly to radio and television carriers for widespread emergency events. You may have already seen these messages, which are voice messages with text scrolling on the television screen.

This following is a summary of the different types of warning alerts available and how to receive them.

### **WIRELESS EMERGENCY ALERTS (WEAS):**

Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEAs) are one of many ways public safety officials can quickly and effectively alert the public to serious emergencies. Wireless Emergency Alerts go directly to your cellphone and can be used to send out urgent alerts targeting certain geographic areas.

#### **What you need to know about WEAs:**

- WEAs can be sent by state and local public safety officials, the National Weather Service, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the President of the United States.
- WEAs look like text messages but are designed to get your attention with a unique sound and vibration repeated twice.
- WEAs are no more than 360 characters and include the type and time of the alert, any action you should take, and the agency issuing the alert.
- WEAs are not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts, calls or data sessions that are in progress.
- You are not charged for receiving WEAs, and there is no need to subscribe.

#### **If you are not receiving Wireless Emergency Alerts here are some tips to troubleshoot your mobile device:**

- Check the settings on your mobile phones and review your user manual (you may be able to find this online too).
- Some mobile service providers call these messages “Government Alerts,” or “Emergency Alert Messages.”
- All major phone providers and some smaller providers participate in WEA. Check with your wireless providers to see if they can resolve the issue.

### **EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM:**

The Emergency Alert System (EAS) is a national public warning system that allows the president to address the American people within 10 minutes during a national emergency. The alerts are sent through broadcasters, satellite digital audio services, direct broadcast satellite providers, cable television systems, and wireless cable systems.

The EAS may also be used by state and local authorities to deliver important emergency information such as weather information, imminent threats, AMBER alerts and local incident information targeted to specific areas. The president has sole responsibility for determining when the national-level EAS will be activated.

#### **OPT-IN NOTIFICATION SYSTEMS:**

Opt-In mass notification systems can vary by region but operate similarly in what reasons people are notified. Alerts received could be about extreme weather or natural disasters, road closures, missing people, or evacuations. These alerts are managed by the local agency that sets them up.

**Alert Southbay:** Alert SouthBay is a multi-jurisdictional emergency notification system used by 14 South Bay cities – including Rancho Palos Verdes - to keep our communities informed about disasters and emergencies with uniform and expeditious alerts. Alert SouthBay is an opt-in alert system using the Everbridge software application. Similar to Nixle alerts, Everbridge sends notifications via email, text message, cellular, and landline phones.

Alert SouthBay will act as the City's primary vehicle for emergency communication. Residents can sign up for Alert SouthBay by:

- Texting “alertsb” to 888-777, which returns a link to register for Everbridge
- Registering online at [alertsouthbay.com](http://alertsouthbay.com)
- Downloading the free [Everbridge app](#) on an iOS or Android device from the [App Store](#) or [Google Play](#).

**Alert LA County:** In Los Angeles County, the Sheriff's Department uses Alert LA County to contact residents and businesses via phone, text messages or e-mail messages in case of emergency. This system is used to send shelter-in-place instructions, evacuation, and other emergency messages. It has accessibility features for people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs.

### Tips to Prevent Vehicle Burglaries


Take steps today to prevent thefts from your vehicle. Residents are strongly encouraged to use "Lock It or Lose It" prevention tips every day. It only takes a matter of seconds for a thief to break into your car and grab your valuable items.

Look through the windows of your vehicle. What do you see? A bag on the passenger seat? A charging cord? A garage door opener? Change in a cup holder? Take it with you or remove it from plain view and be sure to close all windows and lock doors.

Follow these tips to help prevent vehicle burglaries:

1. Remove all valuable items from your car, including purses and electronics.
2. If you must leave valuables behind, put them in your trunk or locked glove box before you reach your destination. Avoid doing so while in plain view.
3. Close all windows and lock your doors.
4. Park in a locked garage or well-lit areas.

If you see suspicious activity, report it immediately to the Lomita Sheriff's Station at 310-539-1661. In case of emergency, call 9-1-1.




## Watch Your Speed!

### Let's Keep RPV Roadways Safe

To help reduce crashes, as well as prevent injuries resulting from speeding and aggressive driving, Lomita Station deputies conduct daily enforcement operations, but traffic enforcement alone will not solve the problem. Speeding and aggressive driving can only be reduced if drivers actively choose to do their part.

Your actions can help maintain and improve the safety of the roads in RPV.



### Speeding is Not Worth the Cost

Speeding comes at a high price. For the speeding driver, there are fines and potentially lost driving privileges, and criminal charges. For other motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists, there could be fatal consequences. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration ([NHTSA](#)), about one-third of vehicle fatalities are the result of speeding. It is a high price to pay for traveling a few extra miles per hour. Speeding is not worth the cost!

### How to Report Speeding

If you are aware of a dangerous condition or a continual traffic violation, report it to the Lomita Sheriff's Station's non-emergency line at 310-539-1661. If you see someone driving in a dangerously reckless manner, including swerving, speeding, texting, or behaving aggressively, **pull over** and call 9-1-1.

## FINANCE DEPARTMENT

### 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter Home Sale History

California home sales closed out the third quarter by reversing a four-month decline and posting the largest monthly increase in over a year. Home prices continued to exhibit strong growth from last year. The statewide median home price declined 2.3 percent to \$808,890 from the prior month and increased 13.5 percent from \$712,430 in September 2020. In the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, the median home price increased from \$1.4 million at the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter in 2020 to \$1.7 million in Q3 of 2021, a 21.4% increase. The median price in California remained above the \$800,000 benchmark for the sixth consecutive month, but the double-digit price year-over-year price gain was the smallest in 14 months.

### New Traffic Signal at Intersection of Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East Update



Concrete was poured for most of the pole foundations last Friday, and work continues this week digging the remaining foundations for the new traffic signal project at the intersection of Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East. The remaining concrete foundations are expected to be poured this Friday.

Next week electrical work will be performed, and a crane is

scheduled for next Thursday and Friday to be used for installing the poles.

Work is limited to approximately 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, with regular partial eastbound and west bound bike lane closures around the intersection. Expect delays, proceed cautiously through the work zone, and follow all signs and instructions. The signal is expected to be complete by the end of December.

## Regular Trash/Recycling Collection on Veteran's Day and Holiday Schedule for Thanksgiving Day

There will be NO DELAY in the trash/recycling collection on Thursday, November 11 (Veteran's Day).

There will be no trash, recycling, or green waste collection on Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, November 25. The Thursday route will be serviced on Friday, November 26, and the Friday route will be serviced on Saturday, November 27. Monday through Wednesday, the collection will remain unchanged. ### **No Construction on Thursday, November 11th (Veteran's Day Holiday)**

Pursuant to Section 17.56.020(B) of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code, it is unlawful to carry on construction, grading, or landscaping activities, or to operate heavy equipment except between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. Monday through Friday, and between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. on Saturday. No such activity shall be permitted on Sundays, or the legal holidays (within the city's

permitted construction hours), unless a Special Construction Permit is approved by the Community Development Director. Click [here](#) to download the Special Construction Permit application. ## Swale Maintenance Reminder

Swales tend to become filled with leaves, overgrown vegetation, and debris over the course of the year. As a reminder, it is a property owner's responsibility to maintain a drainage swale so that it functions properly. Improperly maintained drainage swales interferes with proper drainage flows that can result in property damage caused by slope failure, erosion, or excess storm-water runoff.



As an additional reminder, the City's Municipal Code does not permit the construction of any structure within or above a drainage swale, or on a slope on or equal to 35% or greater. This includes decks, stairs, or structures of any kind. Please keep this in mind if you're planning a project near or on a slope.

## Water Conservation Tips

In October, Governor Gavin Newsom issued a proclamation extending a drought emergency statewide to eight counties, including Los Angeles County, that were not previously included in the Governor's July drought state of emergency proclamation. These proclamations are in response to the second driest year on record and with near record low storage in California's largest reservoirs.



Conserving water doesn't have to mean a major lifestyle change. It can be as simple as taking a shorter shower or turning off the water while brushing your teeth. Below are some easy ways to conserve water in and around the house:

- Use only as much water as your yard needs. If your grass springs back when you

step on it, it doesn't need to be watered.

- Fix leaky faucets, plumbing, and sprinklers. Saves up to 500 gallons per month.
- Run only full dishwasher and washing machine loads. This can save you up to 800 gallons per month.
- Install a water efficient faucet sink aerator and turn off water when shaving or brushing your teeth. Saves five (5) gallons per day.

The rink will operate for a total of 14 days in December. Below are the proposed dates and times (including the week school is out on holiday break):



## Preserve-Related Municipal Code Changes

On November 2, 2021, the City Council adopted the second reading of Ordinance No. 650, which makes the following changes to the City's Municipal Code:

1. Renaming RPVMC Chapter 12.16 to include the word "Preserve," and to read, "Streets, Parks, Preserve, and Recreational Facilities."
2. Repealing and replacing RPVMC 12.16.010 to prohibit damage to City facilities, including vegetation.
3. Repealing and replacing RPVMC 12.16.045 to prohibit ultralights, including paragliding, from flying over City property.
4. Adding RPVMC 12.16.170 to regulate vending, commercial services, and industrial activities in parks, Preserve, beaches, and recreational facilities.

These Municipal Code amendments go into effect on December 2, 2021. Additionally, on November 2, 2021, the City Council introduced Ordinance No. 653 to regulate the operation of certain motorized vehicles and to prohibit motorized bicycles and electric bicycles in the City's parks, Preserve, beaches, and recreational facilities. Ordinance No. 653 also establishes a policy for using other power-driven mobility devices in recreational areas in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The second reading of this ordinance be considered at the November 16 City Council meeting.

## **ParkMobile Parking System Update**

Following City Council action on October 5, the following changes have been made to improve the ParkMobile parking reservation system in the Del Cerro area:

- Allow same-day reservations (cutoff one hour prior to reservation start) with change to one-hour blocks of time at a pro-rated amount if feasible.
- Create simplified access to the ParkMobile reservation link
- Improve instructional signs
- Discontinue requiring reservations for Recreational Residential Parking Permit holders
- Incorporate a QR code that directs people to the reservation page.

Reservations currently end at 5:45 p.m.

A further update on the ParkMobile parking system and Preserve parking issues is scheduled for the December 21 City Council meeting. A total of 86 ParkMobile reservations were made between November 1-7: 59 paid reservations and 27 free reservations. The ParkMobile system was down on Saturday, November 7-no reservations were taken. Residential Parking Permit holders can park within Del Cerro Park. Staff will continue to report on total reservations and other data points each week.
